Did you know? On July 2, 1937, the vigil at the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier began at midnight on that date and has remained constant ever since? The Sentinels will mark the occasion of the 84th anniversary of the assumption of the 24-hour post next week in a special manner. White Rose Bouquet of the Centennial

As the Centennial approaches, and more ceremonies are being conducted all over the US and in France, we have had questions arise as to how to use the white rose in ceremonies. The Society has declared the white rose to be our official flower, as an homage to Sergeant Edward Younger's use of spray of white roses to select the World War I Unknown Soldier on October 25, 1921, and we will use it in all our ceremonies.



With the help of the American Rose Society our Never Forget Garden Project team developed guidance on how to incorporate the white rose into your ceremonies as appropriate, as well as create a 12-step document on how to create your Never Forget Garden.
